Workshop Title: *Preparing to Practice in Integrated Health Care Systems*

Workshop Presenter: Bart Green, DC, MEd, DACBSP. Dr. Green is a full-time chiropractor for a major regional military medical center. He has worked in integrated care settings ranging from athletic event-site care and the US Olympic Training Center to multidisciplinary military sports medicine clinics and a combat casualty care center.

Workshop Description: In this 8-hour continuing education course, participants will learn about integrated health care settings. Using active learning strategies such as reflective surveys, group exercises, and games, participants will learn how chiropractic providers can thrive in integrated health settings, from large hospitals to small clinics. The workshop will focus on evidence-based methods for improving patient care and considerations pertinent to serving unique patient populations in the integrated setting.

Workshop Learning Objectives: By the end of the workshop, participants should be able to:

- Describe various models of integrated health care settings
- Compare and contrast integrated health care with integrative medicine
- Measure their readiness to engage in integrated health care
- Describe and discuss the “Triple Aim” and its relevance to integrated health care
- Prepare to apply for positions in integrated health care settings

Hour 1: Assessing participants’ readiness for integration, readiness for change scale; attitudes and beliefs regarding interdisciplinary practice; defining the environment of integrated health care.

Hour 4: Safety, effectiveness, value, the Triple Aim & how health care organizations perceive these concepts

Hour 5: The relative value of integrated care and interprofessional collaboration; send a problem

Hour 6: Professional development necessary to participate in integrated environments

Hour 7: How to succeed in integrated care environments

Hour 8: Pitfalls to avoid, wisdom of the crowd, reassessment of readiness for integration
